	<b>1.9</b> Powers forbidden to Congress	<b>1.9.1</b> No prohibition of slavery before 1808 <b>1.9.2</b> Protection of Habeas Corpus <b>1.9.3</b> Prohibition on bills of attainder and ex post facto laws <b>1.9.4</b> No direct tax (changed by 16th Amendment) <b>1.9.5</b> No taxes on states exports <b>1.9.6</b> No preference in commerce for one state over another <b>1.9.7</b> No spending without congressional appropriation <b>1.9.8</b> No titles of nobility
	<b>1.10</b> Powers forbidden to states	<b>1.10.1</b> No treaties, letters of marque or reprisal, coining money, bills of credit, bills of attainder, ex post facto laws, titles of nobility, establishing anything but gold & silver coin as money <b>1.10.2</b> No duties on imports or exports without consent of Congress <b>1.10.3</b> No duty on tonnage, keeping of troops or ships in times of peace, agreements with other states or foreign powers, or war unless attacked

Executive Department</b>	<b>2.1</b> The office of the President	<b>2.1.1</b> 4 year term for President and Vice President <b>2.1.2</b> Appointment of electoral college & who is eligible <b>2.1.3</b> Process of electoral college voting (changed by 12th Amendment) <b>2.1.4</b> Time of electoral vote <b>2.1.5</b> Qualifications for office of President <b>2.1.6</b> Replacement of President mid-term (changed by 25th Amendment) <b>2.1.7</b> Pay and limits to compensation <b>2.1.8</b> Presidential oath of office
	<b>2.2</b> Powers of the Court	<b>2.2.1</b> Military duties, executive departments, pardons for offenses <b>2.2.2</b> Making treaties, appointment of officers <b>2.2.3</b> Filling vacancies during recess of the Senate <b>2.3.1</b> State of the Union report, direct Congress to convene or adjourn, receive ambassadors, execute laws <b>2.4.1</b> President, Vice President, and civil officers may be removed from office upon conviction of treason, bribery, high crimes and misdemeanors
<b>III. Judicial Department</b>	<b>3.1</b> Supreme & inferior courts	<b>3.1.1</b> Judicial power in Supreme Court & inferior courts established by Congress, judges hold their office during times of good behavior
	<b>3.2</b> Powers of the President	<b>3.2.1</b> Jurisdiction of courts (changed by 11th Amendment) <b>3.2.2</b> Cases where Supreme Court has original jurisdiction, Congress has power to limit appellate jurisdiction <b>3.2.3</b> All crimes, other than impeachment, to be tried by jury
	<b>3.1</b> Supreme & inferior courts	<b>3.3.1</b> Treason is giving aid and comfort to enemies <b>3.3.2</b> Congress shall declare punishment for treason

<b>IV.</b> Relations between States and with the Federal Government	<b>4.1</b> Powers granted to Congress	<b>4.1.1</b> Full faith and credit given in each state to public acts, records, and judicial proceedings of other states
	<b>4.2</b> Interstate rights of citizens, criminals, & fugitives	<b>4.2.1</b> Equal privileges and immunities for all citizens regardless of state <b>4.2.2</b> Criminals to be extradited upon request of Governor <b>4.2.3</b> Fugitive slaves to be returned (changed by 13th Amendment)
	<b>4.3</b> New states and federal territory	<b>4.3.1</b> Congress to determine creation and admission of new states <b>4.3.2</b> Congressional power over federal territory and property
	<b>4.4</b> Protection of states	<b>4.4.1</b> Protection and republican government guaranteed to every state
<b>V.</b> Amendments	<b>5.1</b> Amendments proposed by 2/3, ratified by 3/4 majorities	<b>5.1.1</b> Amendments proposed by 2/3 of both houses, or by a convention applied for by 2/3 of state legislatures, ratified by 3/4 of state legislatures or by 3/4 of state ratifying conventions
<b>VI.</b> Past debts, Constitution supreme, oath of office.	<b>6.1</b> Past debts valid, supremacy clause, oath of office required	<b>6.1.1</b> Past public debts to be honored by new government <b>6.1.2</b> Constitution and constitutional laws & treaties to be supreme law <b>6.1.3</b> All federal and state officials to swear oath to uphold this Constitution, no religious test required.
<b>VII.</b> Ratification	<b>7.1</b> Process of ratification	<b>7.1.1</b> Ratification of conventions of 9 states to enact this Constitution

## Amendments

### Bill of Rights

1. Freedom of religion, speech, press, right of assembly, petition
2. Right to keep and bear arms
3. Limitation on quartering soldiers
4. Limitation on searches and seizures
5. Protection of accused in capital crimes
6. Right to speedy trial by impartial jury
7. Trial by jury protected, no double-jeopardy
8. Excessive bail, cruel and unusual punishment prohibited
9. Enumeration of rights does not mean there are not other rights
10. Powers not given to Federal reserved to states or people

### Other Amendments

11. Exemption of states from federal suits by citizens of another state, or foreign states
12. New method of electing President and Vice President
13. Slavery prohibited
14. 1. US citizen defined, due process and equal protection to all  
2. Representation in U.S. House modified  
3. Those guilty of sedition & rebellion barred from public office  
4. Dealing with debts from Civil War / 14.  
5. Power to enforce
15. Voting rights guaranteed to all races, colors, & prior slaves
16. Power to tax incomes given to Congress
17. Senators to be popularly elected, no longer represent the states
18. Prohibition of intoxicating liquors (changed by 21st Amendment)
19. Voting rights guaranteed to women
20. Duration of "lame duck" Congress reduced
21. Repeal of prohibition, control given to states
22. President limited to two terms of office
23. Washington D.C. given electors for presidential election
24. Voting rights are not conditional upon paying taxes
25. Method to fill vacancy in office of President modified
26. Voting rights extended to all citizens 18 years or older
27. Pay increase for both houses of Congress must wait until next term
